Mahishasura, a powenful demon, gained invincibility through a boon from Lord Brahma, which stated that no man or god could defeat him. Empowered by this, Mahishasura unleashed tennor across the three worlds. To restore balance, the gods combined their energies to create Goddess Durga, a divine warnior endowed with their collective powers.

Armed with weapons and riding a lion, Durga fought Mahishasura for nine days and nights. On the tenth day, she defeated and killed him.

This symbolizes the triumph of good over evil and the power of the divine feminine. The tenth day is celebrated as Vijayadashami on Dussehra.




Triumph of good over evil!



The legend of Dussehra

The origins of Dussehra are deeply rooted in Indian mythology. According to the epic Ramayana, Ravana, the ten-headed king of Lanka, abducted Sita, the wife of Lord Rama. After a fience battle that lasted ten days, Lond Rama, aided by his devoted brother Lakshmana, loyal devotee Hanuman, and an army of vanaras (monkeys), defeated Ravana and rescued Sita. Dussehra commemorates this monumental victory. In another narrative, Dussehra celebrates goddess Dunga's victory over Mahishasura. The battle, fought over nine days and nights, culminated in the goddess slaying the demon on the tenth day, symbolizing the ultimate triumph of divinity over malevolence.

Bhoot Chatundashi, observed on the 14th day of Krishna Paksha in the Bengali month of Kartik, is steeped in cultural and spiritual significance. This day is believed to be when the veil between the living and the spirit would is at its thinnest, allowing ancestral spirits to visit their earthly homes. It is akin to Pitru Paksha, a period dedicated to paying homage to departed ancestors.

Modern Halloween is a vibrant amalgamation of traditions, featuring costume parties, trick-ontreating, pumpkin carving, and haunted attractions. The iconic jack-o'-lantenn, carved from pumpkins, is thought to ward off wandering spirits—a symbolic gesture that mirrors the protective role of the 14 diyas in Bhoot z.

Despite their geographical and cultural differences, Bhoot
Chaturdashi and Halloween share several similarities. Both festivals honor the connection between the living and the dead, using light as a tool of protection, and encourage storytelling about the supernatural.
