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




A "smoggy" situation...

It's cultural...

29th October to 3rd November marked the festival of Diwali this year. This festival of light is enjoyed in every corner of the country. The infamous "cleaning" before Diwali makes us all some unpaid workers in our own homes but this tedious work becomes worth it at the end when we all get to relish the delicious sweets or "pharal" and soak in all the love, light and mappiness that is spread during this time. But do you know about why this festival is celebrated? What is the significance of the five days of Diwali? Let us find out!

Day 1: Dhanteras.

The word "Dhan" means wealth. It is a day when people go out and purchase gold, vehicles, etc. But mythologically it is believed that Lord Dhanvantari, when the ocean was being churned, emerged from it, carrying an elixir or "amrit" which proved to be a boon to all human beings. So, we also celebrate Lord Dhanvantari, the physician of the Gods, the God of Ayurveda, on this day.

Day 2 : Narak Chaturdashi.

This day marks the defeat of Narkasura, the demon who had troubled all and held 16,100 women captive, at the hands of Lord Krishna. It is a great example of celebration of good over evil.

This day is celebrated by waking up early, taking a "ubtan bath" or "abhyanga snana" before the sun rises and smashing a fruit named "Karit" or "Bitter Wild Gourd" under our foot at the break of dawn indicating the victory of good over evil.

Day 3: Diwali or Lakshmi Pujan.

This day is the main day of Diwali. It is a day on which it is believed that Lord Ram, came back to Ayodhya after being in exile for 14 years. This day again marks the victory of good over evil as Lord Ram came back victorious after defeating Ravan. However, this day is not only restricted to Lord Ram but is also a celebration of Goddess Lakshmi, the Goddess of Wealth. It is believed that on this evening, She visits our homes and blesses us. On this day, new clothes are worn, all the crackers are brought out and Goddess Lakshmi is celebrated in a grand way!

Day 4: Padwa and Govardhan Pujan

Day 4 is celebrated as govardhan pujan. The infamous story of Lord Krishna lifting up entire Govardhan Parvat on his little finger to protect his village against the wrath of Lord Indra is why this day is celebrated. Here in Maharashtra, the bond between a husband and wife is celebrated on this day. The wife makes the husband's favourite food and celebrates their bond on this day.

Day 5: Bhai Dooj

Bhai Dooj marks the day of celebration of the bond between siblings. The family comes together on this day to celebrate each other. Sweets, gifts and promises of safety and protection to the sister are shared on this day.

Mythologically, this is the day when Yama, the Lord of Doubh

Mythologically, this is the day when Yama, the Lord of Death, went to visit his sister, Yami. Yami welcomed him dearly and applied "tilak" on his forehead. And so the day of Bhai Dooj, celebrates the nurturing bond between a brother and a sister.

hope for new beginnings. It became evident to me that traveling not only provided material for writing, but also nourished my inner creativity, allowing me to perceive the world through a different lens.








